

Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, January 12, 2025

From the Desk of the Pastor:

Neither John nor Jesus invented baptism. It had been practiced for centuries among the Jews as a ritual equivalent to our Confession. Until the fall of the Temple in 70 AD, it was common for Jewish people to use a special pool called a *Mikveh* -- literally a "collection of water" – as a means of spiritual cleansing, to remove spiritual impurity and sin. Men took this bath weekly on the eve of the Sabbath; women, monthly. Converts were also expected to take this bath before entering Judaism. John preached that such a bath was a necessary preparation for the cataclysm that would be wrought by the coming Messiah. Jesus transformed this continuing ritual into the one single, definitive act by which we begin our life of Faith. In effect, He fused His Divine Essence with the water and the ceremony.

Jesus' baptism by John was a mystical experience that Jesus felt deep within his soul at the crucial turning point of his life. The opening of the Heavens with Holy Spirit descending as a dove upon Jesus, and the Voice declaring of Jesus, "This is My beloved Son with Whom I am well pleased," are God's revelation to mankind of the Mystery that He is Triune. The presence of the Triune God at this baptism, reveals Jesus' true identity and mission. The Heavens' opening also indicates that this was a moment of God's powerful intervention in human history and in the life of His Son. His baptism by John was a very important event in the life of Jesus. First, it was a moment of decision. It marked the end of Jesus' private life, which had prepared him for his public ministry. Second, it was a moment of identification with his people in their God-ward movement initiated by John the Baptist (quality of a good leader). Third, it was a moment of affirmation and approval Jesus might have been waiting for such a signal from his Heavenly Father, and during his baptism Jesus got it in this announcement of himself as the Father's "beloved Son." Fourth, it was a moment of conviction. At this baptism, Jesus received certainties (assurances) from Heaven about his identity and the nature of his mission. Fifth, it was a moment of equipment. When He descended on Jesus in the form of a dove, the Holy Spirit equipped Jesus with the power of preaching the "Good News."

Life messages:

- (1) The baptism of Jesus reminds us of our identity. It reminds us of who we are and Whose we are. By Baptism we become sons and daughters of God, brothers and sisters of Jesus, members of his Church, heirs of heaven, and temples of the Holy Spirit.
- (2) Jesus' baptism reminds us also of our mission: to experience the presence of God within us, to grow daily in intimacy with God, and to live as God's beloved children.
- (3) It is a day to thank God for the graces we have received in Baptism, to renew our Baptismal promises and to preach Christ's "Good News" by our transparent Christian lives of love, mercy, service, and forgiveness.

Safe Environment




St. John Neumann (1811—1860) is the patron saint of Catholic education. From a young age, John wanted to become a priest, and he entered the seminary in his homeland of Bohemia, in present day Czech Republic. He completed his seminary studies, but his ordination date was not set because Bohemia had enough priests at the time. Determined to become a priest, John decid-

ed to go to America and ask to be ordained there. He arrived in New York City in 1836. Fortunately, the Bishop of New York needed more priests for his diocese. Within 16 days, John was ordained and then sent to the geographically large parish of Buffalo, New York. He chose the more difficult assignment of caring for those in rural areas of the parish. His life there was harsh: he had to walk long distances between farms, his log cabin rarely had heat, bread was his main dietary source, and he slept a few hours each night. He had little money, but what he had he used to support his churches and schools. In 1842, he joined the Redemptorists Missionary Order. In 1852, he became Bishop of Philadelphia. Bishop Neumann built 50 churches and nearly 100 Catholic schools in his diocese. He died in 1860 at the age of 48 and was declared a saint by Pope Paul VI in 1977. His feast day is January 5.









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
